Financial Management in Canada

Architectural Preservation and Conservation

Applied Digital Geography and GIS

This certificate program has been developed for professionals currently practising or anticipating careers in government, industry, utilities, planning, municipal services, health, and retailing, who wish to enhance their professional skills in digital geography and geographic information systems (GIS). The certificate is designed to provide both training and education in digital geography.

The program responds to today's need for enhanced computer literacy in the management and analysis of digital spatial data, and the application of that data in decision-making. Digital geography is an area of study that concentrates on the electronic capture, storage, manipulation, and analysis of geographic data. Using location as the "look-up" key, disparate data sets can be linked and related to each other for a whole range of workplace applications. Following initial courses in which principles and concepts of digital geography and fundamental skills in GIS are introduced, the workplace applications are stressed in courses aimed at specific specialties. Higher level courses focus on refining GIS tools and implementation issues.

Nurses are on the front line in terms of professional and organizational transformation. International Accounting and Finance Professionals (IAFP)

The IAFP program prepares you to compete for jobs at levels appropriate to your previous work experience and skills. The accounting stream is designed to accelerate your path towards membership/certification in professional accounting bodies.

The IAFP program offers an innovative system of supports:

- individualized pre-screening and prior learning and competency assessment
- courses specific to accounting and financial services practice in Ontario
- profession and sector-specific communication and soft skills training
- · expanded employer networking opportunities
- · work placements (if required and available)
- · mentoring

Internationally Educated Dietitians Pre-registration Program (IDPP)

The IDPP is a unique learning opportunity designed to give internationally educated nutrition and food professionals information, advice, referral to career opportunities, language testing and training, and, for those who are qualified, preparation for registration with the College of Dietitians of Ontario (CDO) and Dietitians of Canada (DC).

The IDPP features two main services:

- pre-registration program designed to help internationally educated dietitians prepare for registration and practice in Ontario
- assessment and counselling for internationally educated nutrition and food professionals who are exploring their education and work options

Internationally-Educated Engineers Qualification Bridging (IEEQB) Program

The Faculty of Engineering, Architecture, and Science at Ryerson University has developed the Internationally-Educated Engineers Qualification Bridging (IEEQB) Program specifically for internationally-educated engineers to provide them with an opportunity to meet the academic requirements for professional engineering licensure in Ontario.

The International Midwifery Pre-registration Program (IMPP)

The International Midwifery Pre-registration Program (IMPP) is a nine-month bridging program. It is your route to registration and practice in Ontario. It provides internationally educated midwives with the following:

- · knowledge and skills assessment and enhancement
- orientation to midwifery practice in Ontario
- a three-month clinical placement with competency assessment
- online components
- · six-month fast-track option
- preparation for the National Midwifery Registration Exam The IMPP is intended for experienced international midwives, fluent in English, who have practiced midwifery within the past five years. It is not a re-education or re-training program. There are limited places available in the IMPP, and the admission process is competitive.

If you are an internationally educated midwife, you must take this bridging program in order to be registered to practice in Ontario. For more information and to find out more about your eligibility for the program, visit the IMPP website at www.ryerson.ca/ce/midwife.

Internationally Educated Social Work Professionals (IESW) Program

Are you an internationally educated social work professional who wants to gain a practical and contextual understanding of Ontario's social services sector?

If so, consider registering in courses within the Internationally Educated Social Work Professionals (IESW) Program at The G. Raymond Chang School of Continuing Education. This innovative bridging program is offered nowhere else in Canada. It provides training, mentorship, support, and supervised work placements for qualified social work professionals who were educated outside of Canada.

In just one year, you can achieve the following:

- increase your understanding of how social work is practiced in Ontario and the rest of Canada
- gain social service experience and orientation to the Canadian workplace
- expand your network of social service employers and organizations. The IESW Program has been designed specifically for internationally educated social work professionals who want to work in the social services sector in Ontario. Workplace Communication in Canada (WCC)

The Workplace Communication in Canada (WCC) program's goal is to maximize the employability (and leverage preparedness for professional bridging programs) of internationally educated professionals by implementing the following:

- a comprehensive assessment of strengths and individual needs (Communication Skills Assessment)
- a workplace-focused curriculum (materials developed in partnership with employers and profession-specific bridging programs)
- an experiential curriculum (using role plays, simulations with actors, workplace scenarios, debate clubs, and group work)

The WCC Communication Skills Assessment ensures entry to the most appropriate level of communication and language program. In order to make this program sector/profession relevant, each of the learning tools and modules will incorporate profession-related materials and experiences. As an additional support for successful integration, participants will be provided with mentoring opportunities through Ryerson University's network.
